
History

- Young people taking to the corners to earn money has been happening in Baltimore for at least 40 years
- There have been at minimum 7 previous "plans" or "strategies" to address this issue
- Past plans failed in several ways: not specific enough, not sustainable through changing administrations, not actionable, no short or long-term metrics or tracking

 - Outcomes & data










Squeegee Working Action Plan

- Launched January 2023
- Review plan



Implementation of Squeege Action Plan

- Began in January 2023
- Focus on services, providing resources, and building relationships
- Collaborative work primarily led by BPD & MOAAME
- Disallowed zones
- Weekly data tracking (learned from failure of past plans)




Map of Disallowed Zones




Squeegee Calls (55Q) and Panhandling Calls (55P) in 2024

Call Type Pandhandling Calls (55P) Squeegee Calls (55Q)







Squeegee Calls (55Q) 2023 vs 2024 Call Year = 2023 = 2024



Squeegee Related Calls for Service






Squeegee Related Criminal Incidents





Escalating Enforcement

Intentional conversations and decisions for resource resistant individuals



Continued service offerings



Collaboration with States Attorney's Office



Explore ways to provide quality recreation options for squeegee workers, including activating Baltimore City recreation centers as safe places during non-school hours.

Connect squeegee workers with workforce opportunities, including job readiness programs, employment, and skills training. Provide squeegee
workers with role models
who can serve as trusted
mentors. Establish a peer
mentor program where
young people serve as
resources for each other.

Connect squeegee workers to various services, including mental health and substance abuse counseling.



Reconnect school-aged youth with City Schools and provide academic support. Provide guidance for 18+ individuals looking to continue education.

Identify ways to cultivate the entrepreneurial spirit of squeegee workers through training and entrepreneurship programs. Provide wholistic support and engagement to families of squeegee workers to ensure stability. Prioritize case
management and provide
tailored wrapround
services to meet the
varying needs of
squeegee workers and
families.
